
## It's a piece of cake for these kiddies

"It's also about allowing children to feel part of their local show and proud of their achievement of entering something," Jessica said.

Of course, Amelia and Jessica also love going to the Port Elliot Show - now in its 139th year - to experience the show rides, get close to the small animals, see the horses in action and marvel at the incredibly welltrained and groomed dogs all going for blue ribbons.

And the big attraction this year for the youngsters (and maybe some big kids too) is the appearance of the one and only Humphrey B. Bear, who amazingly first appeared on NWS 9 in May, 1965.

The show, to be opened by Channel Seven's Ron Kandelaars on Saturday at noon, has long been regarded as one of the biggest and best agricultural shows outside of the Adelaide Royal Show. Presented by the Southern Agricultural Society, which was established in 1869 and embraces Victor Harbor, Mount Compass, Port Elliot, Middleton, Currency Creek and Goolwa, the Port Elliot Show is put together by a dedicated committee led by president Steve Rogers, and at great expense.

# Reeling in budding surf lifesavers

e have doubted it during an incredibly wet start to spring, but summer must be on its way – the surf lifesaving clubs along our coast are getting back into action rounding up new junior members.

For brothers Matt and Damion Burrage, of the Goolwa club, their commitment as junior coordinators with more than 70 years experience between them is special considering they drive from the outer suburbs of Adelaide to Goolwa every Sunday morning to help the kids.

They left a suburban club a few years ago to help the Goolwa SLS Club, and Matt, 50, had a simple reason: "You've got a real surf beach... you could not find a better one anywhere, and the people are great.

"I was heavily involved with surf lifesaving running programs in the eastern states for 30 years, and I have come back to it now. The Goolwa club was in dire need for help and we jumped in boots 'n all. I have a 19 year-old daughter Tatjana, or TJ, who has just joined the club after 18 years of resisting... now she just loves it."

Damion, 45, lives at Kensington, but has also been drawn to our great surf along the coast – he's now building at Middleton, and his children, Angelina, 15, and Arthur, six, are both new members of the club.

The Goolwa club has a nipper program (5-12 years) on Sunday mornings from 9.30-11.30 that focuses on learning, gaining confidence and having fun in a safe beach environment,

while the program for five and six year olds also offers an introduction to lifesaving through fun activities and games.

"We have a variation of programs for children, including working with children with special needs – we encompass all," Matt said. "We assess the kids and the programs are modified for ages. It is important to note that all surf lifesaving clubs abide by Surf Lifesaving Australia legislation which provides for one coordinator or water safety officer with five children."



## A slow town with lots of...

# momentum

n the heart of the old Italian city of Greve in Chianti, south of Florence, there is a Franciscan monastery and a triangular main piazza or meeting place where a market has been serving the nearby communities and hamlets for centuries.

Oh, the romance of it all in Tuscany, where the lovers of fine cibo and a glass of vino – as they say in Italiano – can be consumed while dreaming into the night. Special indeed, and believe it, there is so much in common with our Goolwa.

It was in October, 1999, following a meeting with the mayor of Greve in Chianti that the Cittaslow movement (meaning slow town) was formed, and Australia is now one of 30 countries to join – starting with Goolwa in March, 2007 and followed by Katoomba (NSW) and Yea (Victoria). Each town must agree to commit to a set of 50 goals and principles or values.

Thanks to the incredible devotion to the movement by Lyn and John Clark, who worked so hard to earn their much-loved town this status, Goolwa will host the tenth Cittaslow International Assembly from May 9-12, 2017 with more than 120 delegates from around the world experiencing its culture, food, wine and music.

The journey to this international honour has perhaps been under-played because, for most part, there has been a general lack acceptance or understanding why Goolwa should be recognised as a "slow town". Come to the balcony at the Signal Point Gallery on Friday night, October 28 from 5-8 and you will really understand what it's about.

There will be people dancing to the sound of the Mac Tones, while others sit on deck chairs

across the lawns listening while watching the boats from Australia's oldest yacht club, the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club, sail past in their keenly contested twilight races. People will sip local wines from Shaw Family Vitners, and have a bite to eat from the local food trucks or perhaps wait for a beach cafe character

named Olaf ride in on his Cockle Cart; it's like a barbeque on a bike, and he sells buckets of Goolwa cockles in a delicious sauce with a chunk of bread.

Slow? Sure is, and judging by the 300-plus people at the last of these Night at the Wharf events last summer, we love them. Drink the



vino slowly and savour the cockles they will, and let's celebrate we're a Cittaslow town.

There are temporarily three structures of our Cittaslow – a management committee and an International Assembly Planning committee, both consisting of up to eight people and largely driven by Lyn and John, and a food and wine group, in which Karen Ross plays a big part with her commitment to the At the Wharf events.

This may come as a shock, but the food and wine guys have about 30 members (and rising in numbers) who fit well in the category of social drinkers and foodies. They chat a lot too, according to Karen, and remarkably they achieve things during these lovely occasions. Ah, the spirit of Cittaslow.

Karen explains from her committee organises other community highlights like the annual Smoke Off on Sunday, November 6 (see next page), and community "How to..." sessions led by Debbie Smith with demonstrations and lessons on things like making cheese, foraging mushrooms, bottling tomatoes the Italian way, and making coffee. It's entertaining and informative, and Karen believes this largely symbolises the Cittaslow movement that started in Italy 16 years ago is all about.

"The movement is about sustainability, good, clean enjoyable food which usually means that it comes from the region rather than genetically modified," Karen said. "It is part

of an education process and a celebration of that food; rather than genetically modified imported, out-of-season food which was forced grown and expensive. It is our option to open our eyes to what is available in our own region.

"They first started talking about slow meat and slow fish, which is very specific, and about 12 years ago the slow city or slow town movement started. Cittaslow is not only about celebrating and focusing on good clean food, but good clean living and communities getting together.

"Look at what we have got right here, a paddle steamer and steam trains going under this beautiful bridge... the history, the food; there is so much to celebrate in this region.

"The slow food concept started as a reaction to fast food like McDonald's, but some people have got hung-up on that. A chap got really angry with me saying Cittaslow had a lot to answer for because we aren't allowed to have a McDonald's here and his kids couldn't get a job in town.

"I think we have moved on from that... the

beautiful Barossa Valley also has its fine wines and nice food and it doesn't have a McDonald's either and never will. This is our culture, and I think it is a beautiful concept." Karen said there was a strong ambition among the food and wine committee to make At the Wharf events from October-March even bigger, and personally she had learned much from similar events in Brisbane.

"They are doing this kind of thing everywhere in Brisbane... they have food trails, food and jazz events and they're all gaining momentum," she said. "They have a world food theme as in American ribs and burgers, Mexican tacos and whatever the food vans have.

"We have something special too with our Coorong mullet, Goolwa cockles... our Cittaslow platters including pate and dips made from using local ingredients, especially from the Cittaslow Community Garden, which is another special part of the movement.

"Hector's on the Wharf are going to have an alfresco bar this summer for the At the Wharf nights. Steve at the Wharf Barrel Shed and Cafelicious are staying open... it's exciting.

"A lot of the success of the events, concepts or whatever has to do with the people involved... they're really interesting, creative and have their heart in Goolwa.

"Steve Grieve, a highly successful architect on numerous boards including the Adelaide

## It's not always smooth sailing

he crusty lines and silver moustache gives us a hint that Michael Rodsted has seen a few campaigns. "I was one of the iron men in wooden boats," he says with some pride, referring to his Vietnam War days and 25 years in the navy.

And when he talks about his "beautiful old wooden boat that needs to be loved and looked after" you sense a little pain here.

Michael's boat was named *Pandora* when she was built in 1926 at Harry Woods' Boatyard in Devonport, and served as a ferry for the Devonport Harbour Trust for use along the Mersey River in Tasmania. Pandora was one out of the box, alright. The third owner, Melvyn Dalwood, of Lindisfarne, who changed her name to *Seaspray*, fell overboard and drowned in 1958.

Michael, 69, and his wife, Sandy, of Kadina, became the sixth owners in June, but not without more drama. He had to arrange to get the *Seaspray* transported from Hobart, and going over on the *Spirit of Tasmania* sadly a man fell overboard and disappeared. Instead of arriving in Launceston at 6am they got there at midnight.

In desperate need of getting to the Tasmanian capital to purchase Seaspray, Michael immediately set the GPS for Hobart in Sandy's brand new car, which unfortunately guided them through treacherous dirt roads and snow across the Glasshouse Mountains instead of simply going down a four-lane highway. The detour through hell took six hours longer.

But, of course, wooden boat owners never lose their sense of humour, and Michael soldiered on. He placed *Seaspray* on the toll ferry, but along the delayed journey an incredibly fierce storm struck and snapped the ropes holding *Seaspray* and she was battered from one end to the other.

Eventually, Seaspray came to rest in Birks Harbour Marina in the Riverport of Goolwa, where Michael has been busy repairing the rear deck, port side gunwhale, and floor deck – more than \$3000 damage – before sending her up the road to Goolwa Slipway & Marina



for a complete overhaul.

Seaspray is fine, thank you, and Michael is now excited about entering her in the 2017 South Australian Wooden Boat Festival next April.

But while it will be Michael's first festival, Seaspray is no newcomer as she was purchased from Peter Higgs, the vicechairman of the Australian Wooden Boat Festival, in Hobart.

"Seaspray is a very special boat," Michael said. "She is on the Register of Australian Historic Vessels.

"She originally had a steam engine, which was taken out in 1953, and replaced by one of the first 12hp Yanmar diesel engines in Australia

"Seaspray is carvel built with a round bilge – 28ft long with an 8.5ft beam and draws 3ft. The planking is all one-inch Huon Pine on steam bent frames; the decks are made from one-inch celery pine, while the mast and spars are made from Oregon.

"Yeah, she's a beautiful old boat, alright. You don't own boats like this; you are just the custodian." ■

## A hard act to follow

obert Bell has enjoyed a whirlwind stage tour from playing a disabled child murderer in an outrageously controversial play during his University of Adelaide days to last year winning a coveted Adelaide Theatre Guide Best Male Performance Award for his remarkable portrayal as a disabled person, The Elephant Man.

You may recall his brilliance last year in the role of Jesus in Jesus

Christ Superstar, which won him Best Male Actor at the annual Adelaide Theatre Guide 'Curtain Call' Awards.

Bravo! bravo! we shout, while his fellow thespians continue to marvel at his acting and wonderful voice, but it plays absolutely no part right in his current day-to-day performance as a local used car salesman to pay the bills and occasionally take his girlfriend, Ashley, out for a quiet beer with his friends after

a rehearsal with their theatre group, the South Coast Choral & Arts Society.

Stage performances are a tough gig, and at 23 he's taking a huge step by directing the musical *Pippin* at the Victor Harbor Town Hall – nine performances from October 8-22. The SCCAS is a brilliant regional theatre company that has produced 118 stage performances since 1956 earning a loyal following, and to do a musical with – for

the first time – predominantly a very young cast is seen by close observers as daring.

Robert shies from controversy and off-stage he presents his real self as being jovial, humble and well-mannered, but mention the stage and he becomes inspired by its romance and dares to dream of pushing himself to the ultimate theatrical challenge.

Heck, it's his first-ever role as the director and he's asked his mum (Kim) to be in the show; that

really is pushing the limit. Robert laughs at the observation, and suggests she is probably not coping with him telling her what to do, and now again losing his patience with her.

Parents would call this as payback, but it is a treasured scenario started last year when, in her first-ever play, Kim was Pontius Pilate in *Jesus Christ Superstar* meaning Robert knelt on stage before her as she played the part of sentencing him to death. Robert recalls crying on stage upon being consumed by the overall emotion.

"Mum was a cabaret performer, and she always used to perform for us kids," Robert said. "She has never been shy to go up to a band and say, give me the mike, do you know this song? She is a real performer. Her biggest influence on me in regards to the theatre is her singing, and I have such a love for music.

"Mum is going to rock it in *Pippin* in her beautiful role as a grandma named Berthe.

"I have always liked drama, and this show is certainly far from it. *Pippin* is ridiculous fun, I guess. I have always wanted to direct a show since high school (Faith, in Tanunda)... it's where the theatre passion comes from.

"I tried to look for a suitable play, and then I discovered this musical and I fell in love with it instantly. This is it, I said, I have to do this one.

"I never thought directing could be such a hard challenge. It's about wearing a lot of hats, not just creating a show. I have a hand in lighting, set design and costumes. The only thing I haven't really put my nose into is the music and the choreography because we're lucky to have two very talented ladies for them — Jacqui Maynard and Rebecca Kemp.

"I am nervous, definitely, and also excited and exhausted. I think the show will look spectacular and the cast will really bring it along. The company (SCCAS) is so supportive... they put their heart and soul into everything.

"What gives me nerves more than the creative side is all the back stage happening, stuff that I have no hands on that I can't see when I am sitting in an audience

because that's not my domain. The stage has always been my comfort zone."

A hint of melodrama, some may suggest, and Robert has heard the suggested subtle differences between the potential brutality in a sporting arena compared with the stage. He laughs again, and reveals that at school he tried most sports and has more participation trophies and best-trier awards in a cupboard than than any football hero.

"Seriously, there really are similarities because sport and the theatre brings out the character in young people," Robert said. "I have probably noticed it more being a director of this show.

"This is why acting is beautiful... it's those who are nervous amongst others that generally have something special about them on stage because they step out of their shoes and become somebody else. It gives them that extra confidence.

"There is courage here too. If you are playing football at Adelaide Oval or the MCG you are as nervous as anything; same goes up here. Step on stage in front of a crowd and that's a challenge too.

"Acting has been my hobby, my passion. To me it is fun, but I also look at it realistically when there is a 95 per cent unemployment rate for actors.

"I have never treated acting as a career up until recently when I signed with an agent which hopefully may lead to something in the future. "Until recently I have never actually studied acting. Everything that I have learnt so far has been from shows, from directors, but now I am doing a course which is for film work. It's going back to the very basics, and that's good. You forget them and you start to over-complicate things, and it's the simple stuff that makes it special.

"Theatre is about expressing

yourself; that's all you have to do. The cast develop friendships whereas, before they knew theatre, they would have never talked to anyone; ever. You learn life lessons through theatre; the disciplines. It's about the director, the cast and crew building something together and it is special.

"I do the theatre not to win awards; I do it for the social aspect. I don't do it for the applause either, even though it is great and gives you a feeling of satisfaction. The biggest thing is the social aspect. You find yourself in the same boat as others who may not have fit in at high school but they went down a path and met another bunch of weirdos who all just like to act.

"Footballers have a lot of courage, and sometimes it also takes courage to be what you really want to be, and for me since school it has always been an actor."

Right now Robert Bell is kicking a lot of goals of his own. Remember the name. ■



Over the past two years Nat has not only facilitated the introduction of several VET and Certificate II and III courses Conservation and Land Management and Horticulture for senior school students, she has introduced student recycling programs, established a school based community network nursery and maintained a busy teaching schedule delivering mainstream science, heath and agriculture subjects to students across the College.

Nat said her philosophy was that if young people were given the opportunity to learn about nature, they would naturally value it, respect it and care for it. "I have been involved in a number of areas as an environmental educator and conservationist



## A fresh new look for Victor **Harbor's Mainstreet Precinct**

The heart of Victor Harbor's Mainstreet Precinct has been transformed. Have you seen it yet?

The intersection of Ocean and Coral Street in Victor Harbor's Mainstreet Precinct is now boasting a fresh new look as a result of Stage 1 of the Mainstreet Precinct Upgrade.

The first stage of the upgrade was completed at the end of August and involved new paving, street lighting, garden beds, street furniture, landscaping, drainage and feature art.

The design of the upgrade draws upon Victor Harbor's local marine environment and maritime history.

Cental to the design, particularly Stage 1, is the analogy of the whale. Southern Right Whales are iconic to Victor Harbor and this is celebrated in the design. The dimensions of the intersection reflect the size of a mature Southern Right Whale.

The various planting beds within the Precinct form a distinctive organic pattern along the street, emulating the barnacle clusters that form across the head of the whale. While the unique street lights represent the whale's ribs and some of the seating reflects the idea of whale bones.

The completion of Stage 1 was celebrated at a community street party on 16 September.

The street party was also the launch of Council's digital art project which was rolled out within Stage 1 of the upgrade and involved the installation of a permanent projector in the Mainstreet Precinct projecting digital art on the facade of the Victa Cinema. It is the first permanent infrastructure of its type of be installed in regional SA.

The Victor Harbor Mainstreet Precinct Upgrade is an initiative of the City of Victor Harbor with funding support from the South Australian Government's Places for People Grant Program.

Victor Harbor's rich and diverse history is celebrated in a self-guided heritage trail developed by Council.

The Victor Harbor Town Centre Heritage Trail is a 3km walk through Victor Harbor's town centre to visit 38 heritage buildings.

As you weave in and around the heart of Victor Harbor, you will learn the stories behind these significant buildings and how they have contributed to making Victor Harbor what it is today.

Since 2010, the City of Victor Harbor has identified many State and Local Heritage listed buildings, and provided them with a blue heritage plaque.

While there are over 50 plaques, each one outlining and promoting Victor Harbor's built heritage, the trail focuses on a selection within a comfortable walk that takes around 1.5 hours.

A trail map is available at the Victor Harbor Visitor Information Centre or the Civic Centre. The map also includes a snapshot of the heritage buildings along the trail.

So if you are looking for something to do on a sunny afternoon in Victor Harbor. why not grab the Town Centre Heritage Trail map and get exploring!

## Stroll along the new foreshore promenade



The foreshore promenade boardwalk, located behind the Victor Harbor Visitor Information Centre at the Causeway, is complete and is already being well used.

The boardwalk was part funded through the State Government's Open Space Grant Program. It links the Encounter Bikeway through the Victor Harbor CBD and provides safe passage for both cyclists and pedestrians.

The boardwalk was built by McMahon Construction using long-life products; fitting for its foreshore location. The project also involved the installation of solar lighting, signage and revegetation works.

Further works to improve the Encounter Bikeway are planned within the Victor Harbor Bicycle Strategy to make this one of the most iconic shared pathways in Australia.



## Bikers set to invade Fleurieu for BSA rally

More than 120 bikers and their magnificent machines from around South Australia and the eastern states will descend on Victor Harbor and across the Fleurieu Peninsula for the 25th BSA Owners Club national rally on November 5-6.

The club, with 170 members, runs a rally alternatively in SA, Victoria, NSW and ACT, and this year the oldest entry will be a 1931 BSA, the smallest a 125cc two stroke, and the largest a 750cc Rocket 3.

SA has produced such good rallies in the past that it is now being considered to host an international BSA rally in Victor Harbor in 2020 or 2021.

The BSA - Birmingham Small Arms - company was formed in 1861 to make rifles, and produced its first motorcycle in 1919. The BSA Owners Club was formed in 1990 and is essentially a one-make club although many of the members have other British makes.

According to Jim Nixon of the

BSA Owners Club of SA, it's this history of one of Great Britain's traditional company's, plus the beauty and fascination of its motorbikes that makes the BSA special.

"The BSA bikes were the most popular in the world until the late 70s when the Japanese introduced their bikes," Jim said. The rally has attracted about 75 motorcycles with their proud owners going on tour to Port Elliot and through Middleton to Currency Creek, Ashborne, Strathalbyn, Milang, Clayton Bay and back to Victor Harbor via Goolwa on the Saturday, and on the Sunday to Parawa, Torrens Vale, Yankalilla, Myponga, over the dam wall to Carrikalinga, Normanville, Yankalilla and to Inman Valley.

Turn the cream cheese on to a serving plate to form a mound, and discard container. Pour enough sweet chilli sauce over the cheese, to cover. Just before serving, place chopped avocado, tomatoes and red onion in a bowl. Add chopped coriander and stir gently to combine. Distribute this mixture over the top of the cream cheese and chilli sauce. Serve with corn chips, or biscuits suitable for dipping.

# Apple & Pear Crumble


#### Ingredients

- 3 large cooking apples
- 3 pears
- 3 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons softened butter
- ½ cup self raising flour
- 3 level tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons rolled oats
- 1 tablespoon shredded coconut



Pre-heat oven to 180°C. Peel and core pears and apples. Chop into small pieces. Distribute over the base of a buttered pie dish or casserole dish, and add water.

Place self raising flour in a bowl, and using clean, dry hands rub in the butter until mixture becomes crumbly. Stir through brown sugar, coconut and rolled oats. Spoon the crumb mixture over the pears and apples, to cover.



Can be served with cream, ice cream or custard.

**Note:** Granny Smith apples are ideal for this recipe. Steel cut oats are finer than traditional rolled oats, and are good if you prefer a finer crumble texture.

Serves 4.

1 cup olive oil

1/3 cup white vinegar or lemon juice

½ teaspoon mustard powder

½ teaspoon sugar

½ teaspoon salt


¼ teaspoon black pepper

1 clove garlic (optional).


#### Method
