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
### March



### HISTORY IN THE **MAKING**

How's this for great promotion – the Great Southern Football League has scheduled an open game of women's football between Yankalilla and Goolwa-Port Elliot at Penneshaw on Saturday, March 14. The main GSFWL season starts the following day - 14 rounds

plus an inter-association game against Southern Football League on June 6 and country championships in Kadina on July 11.

Meanwhile, the executive is keen to introduce a GSFL Hall of Fame and is asking its clubs to suggest those whom they believe are most worthy of consideration for this recognition.

Possible inductees may include volunteers, players, umpires, coaches and administrators, or in many cases have filled numerous roles.

Integrity, sportsmanship and to be of good character are essential requirements to be awarded the highest accolade that the league may bestow on any individual. Leading this huge search on behalf of the GSFL is Jan Bache, who was recruited by the executive.

Willunga is one of the oldest football clubs in SA having been formed in 1874 – four years ahead of Goolwa. Other early formation teams competing from 1880-1923 were Yankalilla, Strathalbyn and Port Elliot. The GSFL was formed on May 19, 1923 with Encounter Bay, Goolwa, Hindmarsh Valley, Port Elliot and Victor Harbor. In time, it changed to a league rather than an association, and new clubs emerged.

While on Australian football history, at a national level we are certain to hear more argument that Harrison, Wills & Co, who formed the Melbourne Football Club in 1858, weren't the creators of our great game. There is strong anecdotal evidence supporting Indigenous

tribes playing Marn Grook or marngrook, from the Woiwurung language for 'ball' or 'game', over south-eastern Australia as early as 1841. Marn Grook was played in halves (moieties) between teams representing symbols of a black cockatoo and white cockatoo kicking a ball made from stuffed possum skin.

The Community Nursery at the District Council of Yankalilla depot is being transformed thanks to Conservation Volunteers Australia which has provided this magnificent project with an on-site coordinator - Kathryn Hostie.

Kathryn will be working some passionate volunteers on this program focusing on further improving events/education and equipment levels in an organised work area with all-weather shelter.

### **MOVING PODCAST**

As we approach Anzac Day on April 25 Aldinga-based Megan Spencer has produced and presented a brilliant podcast *From A Whisper To A Bang!*.

# Putting old heads on young shoulders


his Indian-born chap pictured went through school and adolescence absorbing jibes, at times deplorable prejudice after his family moved to Adelaide when he was three-years-old.

However, with his Spanish ancestral Christian name of Juan followed by Smith — the most prevalent surname in the western world — and now having a strong Aussie accent, liking our footy and knowing of Jimmy Barnes some may suggest it goes a long way to being 'one of us'.

'Good on 'ya, mate' we may say, but with a broad smile our 'Smithy' asks: "Who are we?"

This simple question will be put to a group of 20 teenagers aged 13-16 during a three-day camp in Douglas Scrub near McLaren Flat on March 20-22 as part of a new Fleurieu Leaders Youth Program. Juan is part of a team presenting this camp with the aim of helping these kids get through their myriad of social barriers and be better equipped with leadership tools to support others on their own journey.

This project group - Nicky Connolly, Jenni Mitton, Joshua Moorhouse, Claire Neylon and Juan - was formed from within the Future Leaders Program under the auspices of the McLaren Vale Business Association to develop an assignment to benefit our community.

Juan said because these members had each personally gained so much from the program they thought how great it would be if much younger people could also have a chance to learn some of these leadership values

The obvious stared at the project team - if a portion of today's parents are generally finding the challenge of understanding and communicating with their children daunting, shouldn't we be helping the next generation to make parenting easier by helping them with programs now?

Juan believes today's youth have so much more acceptance of diversity in society. "They have a challenge... there is a lot of complexity," he adds. "Our lives were simple and our parents lives were more simple again.

"Now we are across social media platforms, technology, cultural diversity, social diversity, gender diversity. When you navigate all of that how do you get a sense of who and what you are?

"When we grew up kids we had attitudes and that's how it was, one simple way. Now you can choose one of many angles of society to be aligned with and it is trickier for them.

"This program is not necessarily about troubled kids. We did not want this to be a fix-it for those dysfunctional.... a good crosssection - not all natural-born leaders or those who are perhaps struggling with life. "There are leadership qualities in everyone in some form or shape, and to give kids an opportunity to find it by themself is so important.

"Someone once said that if you can give a

child a sense of self-worth you can achieve for them more than any adult has achieved in their lifetime. It is so true.

"The teenagers will learn from action rather than theory. We have engaged a group called Adventure Systems to have activities like orienteering, rock climbing, abseiling, and by helping each other and working in groups to perform these tasks they will learn the qualities and values of of leadership, collaboration, sharing and thinking beyond yourself. That's what it is about; thinking beyond yourself. We'll also add some

entertainment and fun.

"We are hoping we can get the kids to come up with agreements rather than rules between themselves as in confidentiality, respecting what each other says, and basically helping each other.

"The aspiration is that we have other youth leadership groups happening all over the Fleurieu at multiple locations. We do not want to own or hog this program, we want to create it so it can run in other places."

Juan doesn't see himself as a champion of cause. In fact, this program made up of volunteers and wonderful support from Bendigo Bank, City of Onkaparinga, the Awesome Foundation and a host of genuinely caring small business people is in many ways part of his own story of inspiration to discover himself within. Life is great now – Juan and his wife, Maria, have two adult children, and he works full-time at Flinders Uni on campus development including building projects. To get to this part of his journey he had to rise above challenges that assimilation usually delivers. Proud of his heritage, he knew that he looked different, his parents had a different accent and they had different cultural norms.

"I was constantly on the outside looking in even though I felt like one of the Aussies... I was always trying to fit in rather than just being myself," Juan said.

"When you are the youngest of five kids like I am, growing up you feel that you are not being heard, and for me when I was becoming a man I still felt like a little boy pretending to be a man. That led me to explore; how I could find my own masculinity, which led me to a men's group. "I put my hand up for community-type or leadership roles within my workplace even though I didn't feel up to it. I felt I had to jump in there or I would never grow up." Juan recalls having a need to help others find their own sense of belonging so he started a men's group in Aldinga and Port



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Willunga, not to be confused with the brilliant men's shed concept where many older guys may have fallen into isolation and find connection through working with their hands in a shed.

Here, Juan has a group of 35 men aged from 19 to over-60 with about a dozen on any given fortnight sitting in a circle creating a safe, confidential forum for them to share what they may not otherwise share in a club or pub environment.

"It's about how they are going in their life," Juan said. "The objective is asking how can I share and engage with other men with the aim of becoming a better man in my own home life.

"We talk about the authentic man, what it means to be vulnerable, what does it mean to own your own issues and values. We discover how many other men may be sharing those issues who think, I am struggling with an issue and I thought I was a loser because of a, b, or c, and then realise a lot of people struggle with that too. "We ask each other what they do to deal with that. It may be relationship issues, work problems or a lack of work, a lack of

self-esteem or anger issues. We are not

there to counsel each other, merely provide

a sounding board so you feel supported in your own community.

"The intention of wanting to become a better man starts with exercising more integrity. An example may be saying out out loud 'I want to be nicer to my wife' and others in the group say, 'what are you going to do about that?' The man says, I'll go for a walk, that's a start. The group says, ring us after you have done that, and why not take her for a coffee'. We call that support accountability. It can be a really powerful thing in helping each other, and everything stays within the circle.

"Our men's group started three years ago through support from Ben Buckfield and

Charles Manning. It is not a new idea; we were just keen to start one down south. "Through this men's group I have learnt a lot about myself. I'm in my early 50s now and I am starting to get a sense of my own self, I have my own self-worth and I know who I am as a person.

"I have a love for my country of cultural origin... I don't want to dwell on my past, but knowing where you came from and what made you whom you are helps with your own identity.

"I guess it was this self-discovery that became the drive for me to be part of a team to create this Fleurieu Leaders Youth Program. I remember sitting in this circle of men listening intensely and thinking wouldn't it be great if more of us were able to see life and ourself more clearly at a younger age."

There is an idiom suggesting that you can't put an old head on young shoulders, but while we don't wish upon teenagers to have our wrinkles we can at least give them the best chance of displaying wisdom and sound judgement earlier than we did.

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e have been blessed with many great South Australians of note. Wonderful achievers like legendary cricketer Donald George Bradman, although he wasn't born here, social worker Julia Warren Farr whose work more than a century ago with people with a disability remains profound, and Robert Lee Hawke, whom some may cruelly remember more for his pint sculling and Ocker quotes than his political prowess.

There are also our lesser known marvels – volunteers – in their tens of thousands like Trevor Sharp. We can't place them on hallowed walls of fame, but in the simplest of terms they are ordinary people doing exceptional things for their community and are nonetheless great South Australians. Trevor is chairman of a 10-person subcommittee, which over the past 15 years has put on the McLaren Vale Vintage & Classic. It is what they continue to achieve for the Fleurieu Peninsula that goes towards making South Australia great.

This is a not-for-profit group under auspices of the McLaren Vale Business & Tourism Association, which also works on a host of other community projects.

SA has some terrific events that draw tourists from across the globe, especially the Tour Down Under, but in this case McLaren Vale virtually raises the money from within to put on a free parade of shining Duco and chrome cars that are then displayed at wineries, the economic core of the region. We talk of the sudden dire need need to help our rural towns and tourism – here they have been doing more than their bit for years.

What started out as a parade down the main street by 50 cars with disinterested locals walking the curbside wondering 'what the heck is going on?' has progressed to almost 20,000 people from here and interstate lining the streets in awe of 600 cars and motorbikes in pristine condition. Now, and off its own back, this Vintage & Classic sub-committee launched a brilliant television and newspaper advertising campaign across regional Victoria – from the western towns up to Mildura – inviting them to come here and to stay extra days to see what else this state has to offer.

The City of Onkaparinga has for some time financially and strategically supported this event extremely well, and the positive impact it has poured on McLaren Vale and surrounds has gone beyond the expectations of everyone so much that the council actually told the committee it 'wasn't asking for enough money'. We hear of some most-deserving events that win state tourism awards, for which they are rightly publicly lauded. Sincerely, well done. But according to Trevor, the Vintage & Classic has never been nominated for a state tourism award because it costs about \$2500 to make a submission including sending four delegates to a preliminary judging dinner.

"We felt it would be better to give the \$2500 to the community rather than enter something to get self-recognition," Trevor said. "The thousands of people who line the main street tell us it's a great event and that is our ultimate reward."

Not withstanding this, the committee was twice told to enter the cost-free City of Onkaparinga Australia Day awards and won best event recognition both times. "We haven't entered more often because we don't have the time to fill out the forms," Trevor said.

There is a 'not-to-be-missed dinner of the

eve of the Vintage & Classic on Saturday, April 4 with all proceeds going to the community. Over the past 14 years this function alone has raised \$60,000 shared by the McLaren Vale & Districts War Memorial Hospital and local CFS brigades.

Among many things this generosity has

bought the community a computer program that has monitored the heart of patients at the hospital while simultaneously being viewed by physicians at Flinders Medical Centre. It has saved lives.

models go somewhere different that adds to the equalisation-mode that silently adds to the event.

The Vintage & Classic has never been about one person or one car, but one community. 





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### Racing like a boat out of hell

he petrol heads on water are revving and raring to go for the ninth annual Aquafest at the Goolwa Aquatic Club on April 4-5.
But times have changed. Unlike when the club was formed in 1959 when they raced like a boat out of hell and sometimes crashed they now perform professional spirited demonstrations.

Insurance premiums have soared over 60 years. The club itself is also different. A decade ago you would grab the biggest schnitzel

this side of the Murray and members mingled in the masses scrambling for a table or spare seat, clinging to hope of winning one of 28 meat or veggie tray raffles. A night at the GAC was some occasion.

Now, Mark Harlow and Kevin Tonglee of Blues Restaurant fame do a brilliant job running Fleurieu's Function Centre upstairs while in the original storeroom basement we have GAC. It is home to five clubs under its umbrella covering speedboats, vintage boats, sailing and dragonboats (two). There are a lot of memories here on Barrage Road. Some ponder what happened to speedboat racing through these undulating



years of challenge in this River Port of Goolwa; others bluntly ask the newly-appointed commodore Craig Thornquest whether the club is surviving.

Actually, all is well, thank you. The story here is not one about raking the past, but how a small but immensely proud committee in recent years has responded to the adversity that has confronted them. The Aquafest is possibly the biggest and best organised speedboat event of its kind in Australia. The club now has very healthy financial balance sheets thanks largely to the out-going commodore and now club

patron Graham McFee, and committee

members.


Graham Stevens, who is on the Aquafest committee gathering entries from across Australia for this huge event, was born into speedboat racing at Goolwa. His late father, George, was secretary of GAC in its embryonic years, and these days Graham's daughter, Michelle, who was just weeks old when she

attended her first speedboat meeting, drives her own mean machine at high revs.

"We were brought up on watersport — that's all there was," Graham said. "People, especially the farmers, had ski boats and everyone gathered at the river.

"The Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club held a once-a-year race meeting on Boxing Day and speedboats came from everywhere. Out of that, and the fact guys wanted to go skiing all year round, we started an aquatic club. "We had one speedboat on the river, and when did the first race start? When the second boat turned up.

" A lot of people from Sydney used to come here to race in state and national championships, people like Ernie Nunn, who was known in Australia as Mr Speedboating."

Graham, who used to get off the school bus from Victor Harbor and head to the Murray to ski, was a speedboat driver of national note in between his years moving around Australia and overseas as an instruments fitter with the Royal Australian Air Force. "The biggest challenge facing the sport these days is the cost of competing at top level," Graham said. "It's why our Aquafest is such a big, growing event... it gives an opportunity for those who have speedboats and don't race them because it's too expensive or too intense to actually show how fast they can go.

"To have a competitive racing speedboat you are probably looking at a quarter of a million dollars. You are also talking \$5000-\$6000 a month just to keep it running. "These days we can't race – we have spirited demonstrations – because of the insurance. A lot of people come along who have never raced or been competitive. They just want to display their boats and go around. "You also can't suddenly throw someone into racing a speedboat – it's not like that. The Australian Power Boating Association will make you go to three race meetings before they will give you a licence. Safety is of high importance."

Personally, this Aquafest brings an enormous amount of emotion for Graham, as his wife, Margaret, passed away last July. Her contribution to speedboat racing was also remarkable.

"These days I get up in the morning to go out to the shed and do something on the five boats that I have," he said. "It keeps me busy; that's what speedboats do – they are something that just gets into your blood. "The Aquafest is also a means of catching up with old friends from Victoria, NSW and even Western Australia – plus a lot of local people we don't see often who come here every year.

"Our Aquafest is huge in the world of speedboats. If you go to an average race meeting interstate like one recently in Victoria there were 35 boats, and that was a big meeting. We expect to get 68 entries, and that's our limit because we just can't put more in the carpark."

The Aquafest – it is a free event – has also been the financial lifeline for GAC in recent years. It was perilously close to folding,





and both Graham and Craig believe such ramification would have had serious impact on Goolwa as a tourist destination given that it has been recognised as a speedboat and watersport town for more than a half a century.

Craig, nor anyone else at GAC, has shied from the fact it has endured its challenges probably just like every other sporting club. The focus, he said, was now on what the club was doing moving forward.


"There is that responsibility level upon us," he said. "All eyes are on us. Membership is only \$50, and we have about 180 members, and I can assure you that we are doing our best to support them... giving them value for money on and off the water.

"We have good cash flows, and great support from council, which is important. We also have wonderful support from the Goolwa community in regard to sponsorship. In the last few weeks we secured a major sponsorship with Bremerton Wines.

"Yes, we have probably been like every other club; we have had our challenges. I say to the doomsday sayers look at what we are doing now, look at the programs for the young kids on the water, the cruise days and vintage sailing days and all the other water activities. We are making things happen. "I love the fact this club is offering young children a pathway through sailing. Only recently we had 98 through a development program over two weeks, teaching them the rigors and safety of sailing. They loved it." Stories of promoting watersports at all inclusive levels in a healthy environment also emerge from the neighbouring Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club. The wonderful

relationship these clubs share is good for the town.

According to Craig, ultimately everything is about diligent volunteers like Graham behind the scenes who work incredibly hard to support both clubs that make watersports special in Goolwa. There is always fear of missing someone when naming particularly special club people, but Craig did note the spectacular meal nights put on by good people like Judy Shaw and those who help her. Much like the meal nights during halcyon days of GAC really, only now you have a better chance of winning a raffle. See you in the Jetty Bar at 5.30 this Friday night, and at the Aquafest, April 4-5.


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### Eat Wave with Jenny

### Tuna Mornay

### **Ingredients**

425g tin tuna in brine, drained & flaked

3 eggs, hard-boiled and chopped

60g butter

1 medium onion, finely chopped

3 level tablespoons plain flour

1¼ cups milk

1 cup fresh (soft) bread crumbs

½ cup grated tasty cheese 1 tps fresh lemon juice Few drops of Tabasco Sauce (optional)

**Topping** 

40g butter, melted 2 cups fresh bread crumbs ½ cup grated tasty cheese

Note: We have made this using Maasdam cheese and it was delicious.

### Method

Pre-heat oven to 180°C.

Eggs can be hard-boiled while preparing the mornay mixture.

To make the mornay melt butter in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add chopped onion and heat for a few minutes until opaque and softened. Stir through flour until combined and cook for one minute, then gradually add milk, stirring after each addition. When all the milk has been added, stir through grated cheese. At this stage more milk can be added if needed to give desired consistency. Add tuna and lemon juice, and stir through. Tabasco Sauce can be added at this stage if desired. Reduce heat and continue to simmer whilst preparing the topping, stirring occasionally.

### **Topping**

Place melted butter, fresh bread crumbs and grated cheese in a small bowl, and stir to combine.

### To assemble

Add chopped hard boiled eggs to tuna mixture and gently stir through. Transfer mixture to a casserole dish and sprinkle or spoon topping mixture over the top. Bake in oven for 15-20 minutes, or until heated through and golden on top.







### Apple Crumble

### **Ingredients**

6 Granny Smith apples ½ cup water

1 tablespoon sugar

### Topping

60g butter

- 4 tablespoons SR flourw
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon

### Method

Pre-heat oven to 180°C.

Peel, core and slice apples. Place apple slices in a saucepan with water and sugar. Cook on medium heat until apples become soft and mushy. Remove from heat and transfer to an ovenproof dish.

Prepare topping by rubbing the butter into the flour (using clean hands) Add brown sugar and cinnamon and stir to combine. Sprinkle topping mixture over the stewed apples.

Bake for 15-20 minutes. Serves 4.



### Ingredients

1 cup coarsely grated or shredded apples (2 apples - red or green)

1½ cups wholemeal plain flour

½ cup coconut sugar

1½ teaspoons baking powder

¼ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

2 eggs

2 tablespoons honey

1 cup apple sauce

½ cup plain Greek yoghurt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

25g butter, melted

### Method

Preheat oven to 180°C. Line a loaf pan with baking paper.

In a large bowl place shredded apples, flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and cinnamon, and stir to combine. In a jug (or bowl) whisk together eggs, honey, apple sauce, Greek yoghurt and vanilla. Gradually add this mixture to the dry ingredients, stirring after each addition. When combined, stir through melted butter.

Pour the cake mixture into prepared loaf tin and bake for 30 minutes. Cover with foil and continue baking for 15 more minutes, or until cake is cooked through (inserted skewer comes out clean). Remove from oven, and cool.

Note: If using bought apple sauce check if it includes sugar, and reduce recipe sugar amount accordingly. Beerenburg apple sauce is ideal for this recipe. To make apple sauce add 4 peeled, cored and diced apples and ¾ cup water to a saucepan and heat until apples are soft. Cool, then puree with stab mixer or blender.















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
