For the love of funny Albert and a horse-drawn tram

Albert is as happy as Larry, and rightly so given that he celebrated his 12th birthday this week with extra fuss coming from young volunteers Chelsea Reynolds (left) and Izabella Krieg pictured on the front

And like the other seven Clydesdales connected with the Victor Harbor Horse Tram Authority, Albert is thrilled that this iconic tourist attraction – the only one of its kind in the world that runs all year round - is back into action.

Incredibly, while the coronavirus had a huge impact in terms of the loss of income with the service shut down until midJune, the break allowed staff headed by general manager Meg Whibley to reassess the significant work needed to repair one of the four carriages. It had to be pulled apart, the wheels realigned, timber work stripped and powder-coated, and so much more.

When a carriage was restored in basically the same manner in the 2001 it cost \$90,000. A few years later another tram cost \$180K, and restoration for this one now – again basically the same work – was quoted at more than \$300K. It's being done for less than \$30K.

Meg said in a strange way we can thank the coronavirus for the restoration savings. "It has meant that Adrian Cox, who has done an amazing job training, caring and driving the horses for 17 years, has had the time to be able to go into the stables and do much of the work that we thought couldn't be done," she said.

"It has been a very difficult job because you need to know how to pull the tram part — and obviously put it all back together again. The help from Kym Bailey, who for many years continued an incredibly long family history as a volunteer worker with the horse-drawn tram, has been of invaluable help." Chelsea and Izabella are part of a junior program introduced last October designed to train new drivers and carers. Other young volunteers are Alex Cervante-Fuller and Charlie Whibley.

"The juniors have really helped the horsedrawn service whether it be working with the horses by just feeding and standing with them during the day," Meg said. "They absolutely love every moment here. There is no doubt they are cheap to employ on a Sunday morning to shovel horse poo, but the great thing is that they are gaining work experience and learning

the process before they can learn to drive a tram – when they get their drivers' licence.

"When you look at it you may think there's nothing to driving the tram, but the brake is a winding mechanical piece which allows the carriage to catch up to the horse. They are on chains not shafts, which means you are working that the whole time, judging and keeping your horse in-draught and ahead.

"There is also that sense of responsibility that comes with driving a passenger vehicle. The drivers work and train with the horse and deal with the public; they are amazing."

Meg said the next challenge that was

delayed by COVID-19 was creating a sponsorship base to help develop a stable complex on Canton Road where the facilities were completely inadequate for staff.

The Victor Harbor Horse Tram Authority evolved as an authority or a subsidiary of the council last year, giving it the ability to work on its own more, but still with incredible backing and support from Victor Harbor Council. The board consists of councillor Carol Schofield as an elected member, and independent members Rachel Kennedy, Paul Brown, Nigel Catt and Natasha Hunt, who each have their key components of expertise.

According to Meg, it remains impossible to place a price on the tourism and economical value on Victor Harbor's horse-drawn tram.

"It's special because of the history and uniqueness," Meg said. "Back in the day it was a form of transport or carriage or goods to get the wharf. It is incredible that we have a tonne horse pulling a four and a half tonne tram with people aboard across a narrow causeway to an island.

"The promotion of the horses happens by itself and I guess we don't need a huge marketing budget. But we need an 'everything else' budget.

"People ask why do we pump so much money into the horse tram, but many don't realise the capital that is needed keeping a rail in operation. Feeding the horses is \$27,000 a year, and there is a whole lot more to this than what it appears outside looking in. It is an expensive exercise, but it is worth it. "People come to this area every single day of the year to see the horses. They don't necessarily want to ride the tram; they want to see the horses and the tram take off. It's about the nostalgic feeling that 'I did this when I was younger'." And why wouldn't you come here to see these magnificent giant clod-hoppers in work - Scotty, Jay-Jay, Isabella, Murray, and Elliott. Soon we'll have Chester, who stands the tallest at 19 hands, starting his journey of becoming a tram horse. And, of course, there's laughing Albert

despite the long face.

hey say an artist's emotion pours into their art, and it is certainly the case for 17-year-old Katie Francis when looking closely at her brilliant oil pastel drawings of animals and birds that she loves.

Katie discovered the inspiration to paint through her mother, Sandy, who loved to draw. Sadly, she died from cancer five years ago. Then seven months ago Katie was alongside her dad, Glen, and her brother, Daniel, 19, fighting fires that were lapping their Adelaide Hills home while younger sister, Alana, 11, was inside minding the dogs. Sheds and fencing were left twisted in the heat, but through their courage against odds they saved their two dogs, two horses, 10 sheep, 11 roosters and countless chooks. Yet, despite these ordeals that no doubt she continues to battle with amazing support from her dad and grandmother, Rosemary Francis definitely encouragement - she has taken her artistic talent to a new level by having two of her paintings exhibited in Artworx Gallery, Goolwa. There, the paintings sat, but for only briefly as they were sold. Without doubt, they were among the most heartfelt sales



the gallery proprietors John and Liz Francis had ever experienced – Katie is John's grand-niece. Of course, Sandy would be proud.

Katie knows that she has a long way to be



recognised as an artist of note, but it is the SALA Festival this month in which she will have new submissions that reminds us that art can be by everyone for everyone no matter the level provided the inspiration is there. "I guess my art is a special way of remembering my mum," Katie said.

nintentionally, of course, but it's rather apt that no one seems to know the first name of Mrs E.

Watts, who in 1953 pedalled a tricycle around South Melbourne delivering plates of soup, roast lamb and plum pudding for thrupence.

It was considered the first Australian service of Meals on Wheels, a marvellous concept borne 10 years earlier amidst the Blitz of London during World War II. Our South Australian organisation, which has delivered 50 million meals also stakes claim having been the first to be constituted, but perhaps forgotten by those too worried about originality in Australia is that, like Mrs Watts, MoW has 'nameless' people being incredibly kind to immensely grateful people in need. As we celebrate our National Meals on Wheels Day on Wednesday, August 26 may we as a community thank them, including those working in kitchens across the Fleurieu Peninsula – Aldinga, Victor Harbor and Yankalilla, plus the McLaren Vale & Districts War Memorial Hospital and

Kindness starts in the kitchen

Strathalbyn & District Health Service which also provide a service, and the amazing drivers.

The Victor Harbor branch, formed 50 years ago last December, has on average 25 dedicated volunteers preparing more than 150 meals a week delivered by 60 drivers including an incredible team in Goolwa. The bigger picture shows there are 78,700 volunteers at 740 branches across Australia.

Marilyn Milne, who is manager of the Victor Harbor team, believes people get involved with MoW just to give back to the community. "The organisation is always crying out for volunteers, and

personally I had a particular set of skills in bookkeeping that were needed here," she said

"Meals on Wheels is special. Apart from the fact it provides a service of meals to people in need whom would otherwise have difficulty getting good meals, they also check on them. A lot of people in this need have nobody, and when we deliver the meals our drivers check on them to make sure they are okay.

"If the residents don't respond the driver rings me and I contact the next of kin or whoever to check on them.

"The reality of life for many is that weekby-week our Meals on Wheels drivers are the only face-to-face contact they have with anyone. They see no one. This is not just about the meal. This is all about helping other people.

"For me, it was the chance to get back into the work I used to do. I also enjoy volunteering at Southern Cross Aged Care at McCracken, taking around library books. "In some ways it is similar to what Meals on Wheels provides because we are meeting people who just love to talk to someone - they are so interesting. You see an elderly person sitting there and you have no idea what has gone on with their lives. It's incredible."

COVID-19 has impacted on everyone, but surprisingly our MoW teams have generally been quieter during the outbreak because in many cases their children have worked from home and have been able to provide meals for their parents – a rare positive from this coronavirus.

The lighter workload has proved a blessing because health authorities recommended that no one aged over 70 do their normal MoW volunteering because they may have health issues, or had a partner who was

Marilyn now accepts that some of these volunteers may not return, but like years gone by they wait for others to call and walk through their doors on Bay Road, Encounter Bay.

"The numbers fluctuate, and we are always looking for new people," she said. "Normally at this time of the year a lot of them head up to Queensland."

Sue McGrath helps with the administrative work including organising the drivers, and it's not always easy.

"Goolwa is not short of volunteer drivers, but we are always struggling at Victor," Sue said. "Goolwa has a younger demographic, which is encouraging. We do five delivery rounds a week, and Goolwa two." On this particular day volunteers in the Victor Harbor kitchen led by Jackie Fitzgerald and Kaye Knight were preparing chicken corn soup, and a choice of lamb casserole or chicken fillet with Diane



Sauce for mains. The dessert, a Cinnamon Banana cake with cream cheese frosting, was prepared in the city.

Jackie said MoW was also about making sure those in need were eating something nourishing, which in turn saved the health care system.

"The diabetic-friendly recipes are worked out by chefs in Adelaide, and it's all worked on nutrition," Jackie said.

"There is a certain weight of vegetables for every meal, and then there are those who have their special diets. It's a 240-250gm veggie-plus meal. We have a lot of people who are gluten free, and for a lot of people it is too hard finding gluten free food in the shops let alone cook it." Jackie has worked in the kitchen 10-12 hours a week for the past three years; her mum is a life member of the Whyalla MoW branch having done it for 10. "Some week can be better than others,"

Jackie said. "You have your tough days like yesterday when I got here at half past five and ended up getting home at half past five that night doing orders, waiting for a

South Australia's Meals on Wheels service began as the result of lobbying by Doris Taylor, a wheelchair-bound woman who organised many relief efforts during the Great Depression.

Two decades later, she was the inspiration behind the first meals on wheels kitchen, which was established in Port Adelaide in 1954.

The first president of the organisation was the late Don Dunstan MP, who would later become Premier of South Australia.

delivery, picking up meat and so on." Other days Jackie is home by lunch time which allows her to do her to do other charity work including working in the Lifeline shop.

Joanne Rosenzweig, who shares the passion of helping others, said the more helpers in the kitchen the easier the day becomes. There are usually two head cooks and everyone else is either preparing vegetables or doing dishes. And as Marilyn said, anyone can cut carrots up, and anyone can wash the dishes. And then there's a chap they call the 'Hero Driver', Jim Miles, who at 94 delivers meals to many of those younger but far less able than him. Sue says it's always easy to feel good inside when you are involved with this place; imagine how those in need feel.

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here are blokes and a few ladies who affectionately refer to their Yankalilla Golf Club as Royal Yank. Why not, it's special; certainly different. Club president Darryl Swansson sums it up nicely: "We're a drinking club that has a golfing problem." It's not the Nullarbor Links with the world's longest golf course that stretches 1365km from Ceduna to the West Australian mining city of Kalgoorlie-Boulder. They say it's the distance between each green and the next tee that kills you at this place. Nor is it as rugged as the grassless rock-heap of a course at Coober Pedy. Here, they carry mats around yet the members cheekily stake claims of having reciprocal rights with The Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St Andrews. But on the Fleurieu Peninsula, where there are eight 18-hole courses plus two nine-hole testers, Royal Yank stands out. Different because it is the only one with sand greens or scrapes as they once called them, but extra special because it has never lost the spirit of sport - especially golf - to its very core.

It doesn't charge \$1336 for membership like they do at the nearby Links Lady Bay club, or \$1665 at the Victor Harbor GC, which has become charity-like by registering with the Australian Sports Foundation so it can receive tax deductible donations. At Royal Yank annual membership is \$180 for a million laughs and among many things donates to cancer support groups.

Of course, you would be hard pressed to find a golfer who prefers sand greens created by mixing a specific oil with a particular sand to give a distinct black colour over those with bent grass. Years ago the YGC trucked bags of slag from Port Pirie to mix with sand. Messy, but it stops it from blowing down the road and making it the Normanville Golf Club.

Scoff the golfing purists certainly do at scrapes, but interestingly of the 125 Golf Australia affiliated clubs in South Australia 74 or 59 per cent have sand greens. It all gets down to cost.

Also setting Royal Yank apart with its membership of 82 is that it relies purely on volunteers; no one gets paid, although there is a local chap Scott Grundy who does an amazing job on behalf of the Yankalilla Parks Committee looking after the main oval, hockey field and preparing the course tee areas. However, it's been club captain and five-times club champion Rob Lokan, a real character, who for years has mowed the fairways every week and along with other members done countless volunteer jobs.

Well, not every week. The lush winter fairways turn into a dust bowl come summer, but according to Darryl no one really cares. You get used of the snakes and you still get the Magnus effect when up to 500 dimples get struck in all kinds of directions. Here, you learn to adapt hitting a golf ball and just have fun.

Unlike a vast majority of clubs, on Saturdays they draw the names of the participating members - average mid 20s - to determine the groups of four, and have a high-noon 'shot gun' start at Royal Yank so they all finish at the same time. "I like the idea of not knowing who you are going to play with because you get to know everyone well," Rob said. "One week I'm with the local 'copper' and the next the youngest lad in the club (Rory Long) and they're all so great to play alongside." And when members finish raking the last sand green and get into a round of another kind over the best sausage sizzle this side of the Oceanlinx wave energy generator that has been stuck in the sea near Carrickalinga since March, 2014, the camaraderie reaches fever pitch.

The presentations are something else. At the beginning of the year players are divided into four groups and have their weekly intra-club pennants competition with the losing teams left to do the cleaning up and dishes. Everyone chips in. And, as you may well imagine, there have been quite a few fines for various 'misdemeanours' that come with embarrassment and a lot of laughs. On this particular Wednesday we caught up with Peter Toombs, Kevin Cook, Laszlo Balaton and Darryl after their round and the mere mention of the fines set them off sharing the same story. Laszlo, who seems to have been at more clubs this way than the number of clubs in his bag, said some were the best tales he had ever heard. Among the tame was the day Jason Faulkner gave his dad Lenny, the local

Paul Noble, one of the club's A-grade players, hooked the ball into the last and hit a car. "Who owns that car," asked his playing partner. "I do," said Paul. He hasn't been the only one; someone has even put one through the clubhouse window. They say Dave Noak, a former local policeman perhaps best known as a 'burglar' at the club with his handicap of 29 and at 86 the oldest player in the club, has a golf bag full of 'ripper' yarns to tell. However, there's also a serious side to our Royal Yank, like the countless charity days. The 'Pink Day' has raised \$20,000 for the fight against breast cancer over the past two years. Last year it attracted 98 players from a host of clubs all for the cause so contact the club and get into the action on

Darryl knows that his Yankalilla course is perhaps not as well manicured as others on the Fleurieu, and the clubhouse that has had some incredibly funny stories embedded into the walls since its opening in 1928 is not glamorous, but like all of the members he feels this club is more than that. It's about people; it is a club of character.

South Lakes and Victor Harbor are the only private membership-based clubs. McCracken GC is a separate entity to the resort meaning it could play anywhere, while the other four clubs that are also affiliated with GA – Links Lady Bay, Mount Compass, Strathalbyn, Willunga and New Terry (Wirrina Cove) – are privately owned. There is a nine-hole course at Strathlabyn, and an 18-hole privately-owned course at Ashborne, which is not affiliated.





t was almost five years ago that Gavin Collins and his partner Christina Repetti, owners of Willunga's classic Old Bush Inn, appeared live on the *Today Show* and on the front pages for being the first in Australia to get rid of poker machines from a pub. "Madness," observers said. "You won't survive." Besides, what would a Kiwi know, they said of Gavin.

That same afternoon people rang asking whether they were the pub who got rid of the poker machines. He'd say 'yep', they booked tables of four, and suddenly a social gathering in this beautiful of town was reborn.

Now, amidst COVID-19 confrontation, the Old Bush Inn is among the first to close on Mondays, probably for good as a means of resolving staff roster issues and focusing more on busier times to provide even better quality and service.

It gets down to a business decision, only this time the observers aren't saying "madness", such have things changed dramatically in the hospitality industry. Darn, an All Blacks rugby bloke has given us another lesson. Gavin laughs at the banter – like his

incredibly loyal patrons have since he and Christina moved into the Old Bush Inn five years ago next month. Before then he had spent a working life in the automobile industry having done an apprenticeship as a spare parts interpreter near his home-town of Otorohanga, in New Zealand's North

Island King Country.

He knew every part of a car from the front bumper to the back bumper (they were made of steel back then) – what the part was named, where to order it and so on – and somehow found himself working for Repco in Adelaide for 10 years.

"I always wanted to own a pub, but never had the money," Gavin said. "Once the kids were all grown up and gone and I became a granddad the time was right. You've got to be dedicated; it's 60-80 hours a week no matter who you are because as the owner you are always around."

Gavin's mum and dad were in pubs. His great-great grandfather owned a pub in Russell, known as Kororareka in the early 19th century, in the stunning Bay of Islands, the place of the first permanent European settlement and first seaport in New Zealand.

According to Gavin, ousting the pokies was based largely on caring for the community and realising what type of pub he and Christina, who also works for a winery, wanted the Old Bush Inn to be. It was about turning the place back into what it was once renowned for – it's great food in a friendly family environment.

Gavin and Christina are genuine when it comes to wanting the Old Bush Inn be known for the quality and value of its meals, indeed welcoming approach. They had sleepness nights about removing the poker machines, but they have not regretted the then controversial move since. A few people walk in and still ask where the pokies room is located, and they politely say 'we don't have one'. But they do have families with smiles on their faces.

The coronavirus has again reinforced their mantra, hence the changes.

The 'kids eat free' for the under 12s are back on Tuesday nights. The Old Bush Inn was once famous for doing Porter & Red night — classy but affordable reds over a great Porterhouse steak — and they're back on Wednesdays. The fame is resuming. Key parts of the excellent reputation this pub has enjoyed, especially over the past three years, has been the head chef Dennis Militante, and Katie Oliver who is the restaurant manager. The standards are high; staff are trained well.

Chefs specials include his sensational curry and slow roasted lamb shanks, but the signature dishes seem to be the Sticky Pork Ribs and Filet Mignon – please allow Dennis to cook the steak his way.

There is also the Creole Gumbo rich soup of tomato, chicken prawns and sausage with traditional with homemade cornbread, and the Salmon Laska. All great. Many a great pizza has been devoured by the wood fire.

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The Old Bush Inn is a great pub and Gavin is a most-likeable mine-host, just like Mal down the bottom of the hill at the Alma Hotel and Michael in the middle at the Willunga Hotel. They get on well and share a healthy respect for each other, and Gavin sees this as a wonderful reflection of the people of the town more than anything else. It's a place where they work hard to put on an annual Blossom Festival and a Chilli Festival, plus share in the fun with the Cinemalunga crew with their movie nights. During the coronavirus the Old Bush Inn, like most pubs around the state, has welcomed a splash of paint and cosmetic changes, like changing the outdoor verandah blinds to create an enclosed entertainment area. All of the dining rooms and bars have been spruced up, and an impressive garden area will be ready for some balmy summer nights.

It's another pub with character and with

characters, like Patty, Dean, Amon and the CFS crew. Some drink 'Shakers'. Gavin explains that before his time there was a girl working behind the bar who was pouring half a bottle of Jameson Irish whiskey into big glasses instead of giving them shots, and the owner would come around the bar shaking.

The 'shakers' still raise a laugh or too. Mind you, the few moments Gavin is allowed to tell the lads how good the All Blacks are he bores them to tears. "The Wallabies get paid twice as much and there's not enough money put into junior development,' he bemoans.

They turn the telly onto the AFL, which Gavin also likes, and of course, they know Gavin is absolutely right again like he was with the pokies and will be with the no-Mondays. They say you can always tell an All Blacks fan in a crowd but you can't tell him much. Such is the banter in the Old Bush Inn. Cheers.

Looking after your garden

Time to get started on your garden bed

Spring is around the corner so now is an ideal time to get organised with a raised garden bed. They're idea for small garden plots, court yards and even larger gardens. Remember this - more food in less space. You can plant plants closer together therefore every square inch is productive. Plant earlier as excess water drains better, and the soil warms up faster in spring. Other positives with a raise garden bed include fewer weeds as beds are densely planted and weeds pull up easier, easier pest control, and best of all... they are better for your back.

Choosing a bed

Raised garden beds come in all shapes sizes and materials. They can come in a single unit made from corrugated iron, half-wine barrels are ideal, or in kit form that you may assemble yourself. Check out your local garden supply store.

Make sure that you don't make your raised garden bed too high otherwise it might be difficult reaching over. It is also a lot more convenient if you place it relatively near a tap, especially if you plan to water by hand. If you plan to have more than one garden bed, allow room between them otherwise it's a real pain when the weeds grow



and you can't get your mower or snipper in between them.

Soil

Be mindful of the obvious – that the bigger the bed the more soil it is going to take. It is also very important that you fill it with the best possible soil – you would be amazed with the better results.

Buying a good garden mix from your local garden supply store is advantageous as it will be mixed with a good compost. Your garden supply store should be able to work out how much soil you need if you give them the dimensions of your bed.



SMASHED Sweet Potatoes



Ingredients

olive oil

3 tablespoons melted butter

3 cloves garlic, crushed

1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley

ground sea salt and black pepper to taste

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Method

Pre-heat oven to 200°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper.

Wash and dry the sweet potatoes – leave skins on. Cut off the ends, then slice into 2cm thick rounds.

The sweet potato needs to be pre-cooked until lightly softened. This can be done by drizzling with a little olive oil and microwaving in bursts, or by placing rounds in a large saucepan of water and simmering (with lid on) for about 15-20 minutes, then drain. Allow sweet potato to cool slightly. Place rounds on the prepared baking tray,

and gently flatten with a fork or potato masher – press lightly to avoid completely mashing the sweet potato.

Whisk together the melted butter, garlic, parsley, and salt and pepper. Drizzle each round with a little olive oil, followed by the butter mixture. Bake in pre-heated oven for 20 minutes, or until golden. Remove from oven, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and bake for a further five minutes.

Can be served as a side dish, or delicious served with sour cream and sweet chilli sauce. Cooled baked rounds can be refrigerated and reheated prior to serving.
