It is a national holiday except for Western Australia, which will celebrate the Queen's Birthday on September 22, and Queensland on October 3.

It may seem confusing when Her Majesty's birthday is actually April 21, but the day is really to celebrate the reigning monarch's birthday.

It means that when Prince Charles succeeds Queen Elizabeth II, even though his birthday is on November 14 we will have a holiday for the King's Birthday on the second Monday in June.

The day has been celebrated since 1788 when Governor Arthur Phillip – among horrible things that he did but we won't go into – declared a holiday to mark the birthday of the king of Great Britain.
Until 1936 it was held on the actual birthday of the monarch, but after King George V died it was decided to keep the date on the second Monday in June.

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Master of her own fete

hen Chloe Steuart was just 10 years old her mum and dad took her to the Richmond Primary School where she held her first stall, 25km north east of Hobart. A special place because it was built by convicts two years before South Australia was proclaimed in 1836, and remains the oldest continuously used public education facility in Australia.

Not surprisingly Chloe became mesmerised by the quaintness of the market; the excitement in the brisk early morn. Next day she saw a little sewing machine sitting on a shelf in Woolworths so she dipped into her own savings and bought it for \$20 – and it came with a dream.

The sewing machine gave Chloe the idea of making cushions – the first was round featuring Humpty Dumpty. She sold it and countless more at Richmond Primary as a means of one day paying for university studies to fulfil an ambition of becoming a vet.

Incredibly, at just 10, it led to establishing her own business – Twins Peaks Cushions & Bags – and now six years later creating the McLaren Vale Youth Market at the Piazza della Valle in the main street.

From wanting to sew as part of a semester phasing set by her dad, who home-schooled her, Chloe has not only encouraged other young creators to have stalls at the market limited to those aged 10-25 years, but offered them free of charge.

Entrepreneurial skills at their finest by this basically self-taught sewer, we suggest, but the beautiful part of this story is that she has never forgotten where she has come from, the encouragement of her parents Damian and Sharon, support from school friend Matilda, 15, who shared the vision of a market, and daring to dream of her future from as young as 10.

Then there is twin brother Samuel, who has helped set up and pack-up her market stall (of course, brothers never forget to charge their sister).

This innovative market for the young has enhanced Chloe's business - the name derived from being a twin – to also making and setting up a cake stall which she wants to soon include a coffee machine.

According to Damian, Chloe puts in at least 12 hours a week organising the market. "Other people may not realise what is involved... she might spend an hour and a half at night on the phone to the very supportive Onkaparinga Council saying I've done this, I've done that," he said.

"There is a lot of behind-the-scenes stuff. This is also about Matilda who has helped her most."

Chloe, originally from Rotorua, New Zealand where her parents had a five-acre lifestyle block with sheep and pigs, said that she has loved the atmosphere of the country markets and fairs since the family moved to Orford on the east coast of Tasmania. After touring Australia for a year they settled in McLaren Vale almost three years ago.

"I have run my own stall at a market for six years now, and I have enjoyed creating my own things and having the space to sell them," Chloe said.

"It hasn't always been easy. When I first started at the markets people would see mum and say, 'oh, mum makes all this' and are then quite taken back when they realise it was me.

"Like at the Tasmanian Craft Fair: I was there alone while mum and dad wandered around, and there was this one guy, one of



the stallholders, who was quite annoyed with mum and dad telling them 'you can't leave your daughter there, that's not running your stall'. He didn't realise it was my stall. Yeah, people have got a bit funny.

"At some markets interstate older people gave me the impression that I was taking something away from them. 'She's a kid, this is an older generation thing' I'd hear them say. A lot didn't talk to me because they saw me as competition.

"I guess I struggled to find a market that's regular for young people and supports this age group (10-25). I thought, why not start my own."

Unbeknown to Chloe, Matilda, who is in a year below her at Willunga Waldorf School, was also looking for somewhere to sell her crocheted beanies and bikinis.

"Someone said that I should talk to Chloe because she had done markets before." Matilda said. "We realised that there weren't any markets aiming at what we

wanted to sell so I thought it would be really awesome to create this market. I just wanted to make money from something that I enjoyed doing.

"Chloe did most of the planning, and I helped a tiny little bit." It works out that Matilda helped a lot, actually.

Chloe successfully applied for a \$500 grant from the McLaren Vale Hall & Piazza della Valle management committee which was used for advertising and venue hire for the first two markets, and for marketing the project and offering free sites for other young stall holders.

Before long posters were around the town and, as young ones do these days sent tweeters into action.

Jenni Mitton, chair of the Piazza committee and also manager of the nationallyacclaimed Willunga Farmer's Market, said she greatly admired Chloe.

"We are really excited to have the space activated, and to have a young person wanting to give other young people an opportunity to show their creativity is amazing," Jenni said. "It is beneficial to the whole main street and will bring people to McLaren Vale.

"Chloe has booked the market through to January next year so she is committed to getting it happening, which is really great.

"These days you don't get many young people coming forward with ideas and volunteering. Some think 'what's in it for me' and 'what am I going to get out of it, but not Chloe and Matilda. They are really doing good things for the community."

In between making cushions and carry bags Chloe works part-time in a McLaren Flat bakery.

There is also the responsibility of making this market work, not just because she selffunds it.

"I have to juggle everything, but that's okay," she says. "More than anything I want the youth market to be a successful event, and hopefully I can make a profit as well.

"I don't think I could have done this without the support of my dad, who cuts a lot of the patterns out for me, and my mum - both have been great, as has Matilda.

"I started out at the Tasmanian Craft Fair with this dream of being a vet and needing the money for university, but now I am not really sure what I would like to do.

"I enjoy baking and maybe I would like to have my own cafe or shop hopefully with some of my cushions and bags and other people's crafts. It would be nice."

Actually, it would nice if we all had a cushy job. Well done Chloe and Matilda.

The Mechanic

urn into Watson Street in the beautiful, one-petrol pump town of Milang and you will find the service station. You know it's old because at the front is the shell of an early model Austin Cadet, rusted like the sign: Milang Auto Repairs.

It's full of character, but making this spot remarkable is that 75-year-old

Dean Wakefield – the town's mechanic - walks out and puts the petrol in the car for you, and he's been doing this for 51 years from when it was 36 cents a gallon, or 9.5 cents per litre.

"A lot of people come in and say, 'I can't believe this... real old country service, we haven't had this for ages', but I guess I don't know anything different."

Remarkably, just 21km up the road to

another one-pump town Langhorne Creek there's Darryl and Narelle Frost at their motor and mower repairs shop doing the same, also with a smile. It's a rarity given that a Knight Frank study noted there were more than 25,000 service station locations in Australia in the early 70s, and a Maven Marketing report (2021) revealed only 3459 remained, including 284 in South Australia.

or almost 35 years Darryl and Narelle Frost have also put the petrol in the car for their customers at Frost Motor Repairs in Langhorne Creek.

"People have been saying for years that they cannot believe we do this - and a lot of visitors to the region have asked if they could take our photo filling the tank to prove to others that it still happened," Narelle said.

"This is how we have always done it, and it's good for those with young children or older folk who find it tough to get in and out of their vehicle. I don't know why it's not done more."

And the petrol pump prices are more than competitive.

"We are totally independent, we don't show up on any apps and we set our own prices," Narelle added. "When it goes into the ground on a Thursday our our price is set accordingly and it stays the same until it gets filled up again regardless whether there are changes in the city."

And once again, service with a smile and one for the cameras. No wonder their regular customers love 'em. 🧶

As much as the petrol service is nice, the reality is that most people fear the cost per litre would be exorbitant because of it, and small operators aren't supposed to compete. Yet, on this particular day these service stations had ULP as much as 4.4 cents cheaper per litre than the corporates in Victor Harbor.

It's much like Dean, really. Some assume that having the only bowser in town he charges like a country wounded bull, but he's as fair as they come. Look beyond his oil-stained Penrite trade shirt and immensely strong hands with grease stuck under his nails and discover a big bloke with a soft heart.

Dean concedes that generally mechanics don't have a good reputation, and recited shocking – cruel comes to mind – examples of unsuspecting customers being ripped off. "But a vast majority of mechanics aren't like that," he said.

Like every small operator in a country town there are certificates on the wall thanking Dean for his sponsorship; doing up a Variety Club Bash car to help sick kids, local clubs and SA Police with their community fundraisers and so on, but there is a story about this guy that says it all.

A few years back Dean dropped off a car in Goolwa and noticed this woman pushing her car with two kids in the back seat. He asked his mate about it, and he told Dean it wasn't the first time; the old car kept breaking down; she was was a single mum and couldn't afford to get it fixed.

Dean walked down the street and asked her if he could look at the car, and the woman

said straight away she couldn't pay him. "I don't want to be paid," he told her. A week later he returned with spare parts and fixed the car for nothing.

The woman gave him a hug, which brought a tear to this crusty old mechanic's eye. Word got out about his kindness, and since then 12 people down this lady's street street have driven their car to Milang to pay Dean for it to be serviced or repaired. It also says a lot about them.

"I never get tired of fixing cars, and it's not about the money," Dean said. "It's helping people out.

"In our game we get criticised because they say, oh when a woman comes in all you see is dollar signs. That's not true. Okay, there are some that do it, and it makes it bad for all of us, but most mechanics in small places do a fair day's work for a fair day's pay."

Sitting in the front yard waiting to be picked up later that day was a car owned by a doctor at Royal Adelaide Hospital. He lives in Bridgewater, but brings his car here because Dean discovered the doctor was being 'ripped off' at a city dealership. People from Adelaide, Flagstaff Hill, Meningie, Tailem Bend, Ashborne and Nangkita are also regulars.

However, at 75 Dean is still as cagey as ever when it comes to being paid by those whom he doesn't know. "Some owe money on the cars sitting out there and won't come across with the dollars," he bemoaned.

"Some were here for two or three years, but when I put storage fees on a them they soon came to the party. One owed two thousand or more and they haven't got the money to pay for the repairs, but if I take 'em to court they'll pay \$20 a month and it costs me more money in lawyer fees.

"I had one fella here that had a flash ute. He brought it here to get some work done, and I was a bit dubious based on others saying he wasn't that wonderful. I thought, well, I'll keep the vehicle until it's paid for. I rang him up and he said, yeah, yeah. It went on for months and nothing happened.

"One of his mates was coming in, who has always paid, so just before he arrived I put this for sale sign on the ute with the price of \$2300, the amount he owed me for the repairs. He rang his mate who said 'he can't do that' and the next night he was down here in a flash paying up."

Not surprisingly Dean has seen the town



change a lot. "Most of the Milangites have gone," he says. "People have moved to the city, and the new ones here live busy lives with families and driving to town for work.

"Most of this place years ago was dairy farms and employed a lot of the people around here, but now the grapies have taken over a lot of things and the small dairy farms ave dropped out altogether."

"I suppose my week seems like the one before. I usually get here at half past six or quarter to seven to go through stuff on the computer to find out what I need for the day, and open the doors at half past seven when customers come in for fuel on their way to the city.

"If all goes well I'll get out of here by halfpast five of a night time. Sometimes it's seven o'clock. Saturday mornings I'm here at eight and knock off at 12."

But sadly, there are also a lot of lonely times for Dean. He and his first wife divorced after 12 years and two children, his second wife of 23 years Yvonne died from cancer, and four years ago he remarried again, to Jan, who died two-and-a-half years ago from a brain haemorrhage.

"Some have said they're surprised that I haven't hit the boozer, but I've just got that many things to do and so I keep going," Dean said.

"There are days a lot of people come in and out of the shop, but it's at night time when I knock-off that I have to go home and have meals alone that I feel it, I guess.

"Some nights if the other work buddies are here and it's hot I might sit here in the garage and have an echo of beer with them, but usually I go home cook tea, clean up have a shower and go to bed.

"Come the weekend, by the time I work here Saturday, do me washing Saturday afternoon, do the the lawns Sunday morning then pick up my parts from Mount Barker and do a bit of shopping and that, it's Monday morning and I'm ready to start work again.

"But I still enjoy this. It's always been a challenge, but at different times I think I'd like to have a bit more time off and go fishing in me boat with my mate and do a few bits and pieces.

"I've never really thought about leaving. Anyway, who'd have the money to buy this place being a small area and with all the stock I've got? There's a 40 x 20 shed full of tyres out the back and spare parts and stuff from people who booked me in to do jobs and never turned up so it's just stayed on the shelves because we can't send it back.

"At the same time, there's plenty of work around; I've got heaps of it waiting for me all over the countryside. You never know, someone might come in and say this is what they're looking for.

But would they be prepared to put the petrol into the tank for customers? We hope so; don't tell us that they don't make 'em like Dean anymore.

Challenging times for the small guys

Jaymes Hewett has been one of the 'little guys' running Liberty Victor Harbor for the past six years in a fiercely competitive petrol game.

Now Business is about to get a lot tougher with a Mobil X Convenience and Hungry Jack's store being built virtually across the road.

"I thought eventually the day would come when another petrol station would be come along near us," James said. "It's just the way the world is going at the moment.

"We're hopeful locals will still support us; it would be nice. Our customers have been really good... most are regulars, and what money we make goes back into the town. I'm not sure whether you can say that about the big boys."

Like many other small businesses Jaymes sponsors local sporting clubs and organisations, but he said it's getting tougher to continue the support.

"The big guys are getting bigger, and for all small businesses to compete you have to lessen your margins even more," Jaymes said. "They can't shrink much more, but maybe it will turn around one day. You've just got to push through – and hope."

Local Government Elections

Make a difference to our community

Local Government elections will be held in November this year and residents, business owners and ratepayers are encouraged to enrol to vote and help shape the future of the Alexandrina region.

Make sure you are enrolled to vote

Participating in the Local Government elections is one of the most direct ways you can make a difference to everyday life in your community.

Council's Voters Roll 'supplements' the State Electoral Roll, and entitles people/entities who may not be able to vote in State elections to be able to vote in Local Government elections.

You may be eligible to register on the Council's Voters Roll if:

- You have been a resident at your current address for one (1) month and are not on the State Electoral Roll
- You are a sole owner/ occupier of rateable property (that is not your primary address)
- You are NOT an Australian Citizen but you have been a resident at your current address for one (1) month
- You are a landlord for a rateable property
- You are an organisation/ business owner of occupier of rateable property
- You are a group of owners or occupiers of rateable property.

Bodies corporate and groups will need to nominate a designated person to vote on their behalf i.e. only one vote (1) is permitted per rateable property.



Becoming an Elected Member

Budget meals for the family

Things have become incredibly tough, especially for young families. Prices on the supermarket shelves have soared, and we've been hit with the first of new interest rate hikes to come.

Putting a meal on the table has become more challenging, but it doesn't mean that you can't still have affordable, tasty and healthy options. We have presented some of these recipes previously, but given the added pressures we thought it was a good time to delve into the

budget recipe book once again. The key to these is that it's more economical to make more than you need on the night and have tasty 'left-overs' the next day, or make extra serves and freeze them. Once you have the basic ingredients in the pantry cooking a family meal can be much easier - and more thrifty. Above everything, always remember that you can only do your best.

Hints on making the most of leftovers

Create leftovers purposefully: When planning meals think about what the extras may become. If you prepare twice the vegetables that you will need for tonight's dinner you will have the starting point for a soup or pasta dish later in the week. Anticipate using leftover roast chicken on sandwiches; cook twice as much rice as you need and freeze the extra for later use.

Store leftovers smartly: Glass storage containers are not only reusable and sustainable they allow you to see what's inside. This way you will be less likely to lose track of leftovers. For freezing, use zip-top gallon bags (which can be washed and reused) and label and date the contents on a piece of tape.

Dedicate a leftovers night: If you find your fridge or freezer stuffed to the gills with leftover food, commit to 'eating down the fridge' one night a week.

Turn dinner into lunch: Stash a lunch-able portion of dinner in a container and pack it for lunch the next day. With a bit of planning and no extra effort you can create a week's worth of healthful take-it-to-work lunches.

Think 'ingredients' not 'leftovers': Turn extra pasta or cooked vegetables into a frittata. Blend cooked vegetables with a can of whole tomatoes and create a veggie-packed sauce for pasta. Create burritos with leftover cooked rice, meat and vegetables and top them with sour cream and salsa.

Make soup: The steamed, roasted or grilled vegetables that you served as a side dish one night can become soup on another. In a blender, puree the vegetables with 3 or 4 cups of vegetable or chicken broth, then warm the soup in a pot. Season to taste with salt and pepper, and finish the soup with a bit of pesto, olive oil or croutons.

Salvage stale bread: If that loaf of good bakery bread loses its freshness do what the Italians do: halve the loaf crosswise, drizzle it with good olive oil and rub it with the cut side of a halved ripe tomato. Season the bread with salt and pepper, wrap in foil and bake until warm.

Stash vegetable scraps: An alternative to composting keep vegetable scraps to make stock. Keep a zip-top bag in the freezer and add trimmings: carrot and fennel tops, ends of onions or leeks, tomato cores, stems of herbs and greens and the like. Produce that's past its prime in the fridge may go in, as well. When the bag is full defrost the contents, dump into a pot and add water to cover. Simmer for 2 hours, strain and you will have better-than-store-bought veggie stock.

Portion and store: Many food products come in extra-large sizes, which may be more economical. If you won't use all that sliced bread right away, for example, separate the loaf into portions your family will use in a day. Place a sheet of waxed paper between the portions, wrap and freeze. Tortillas, pita bread and similar items can be saved the same way. Likewise, divide money-saving large packages of meat into portions and freeze.



Peanut Butter & Banana Biscuits

Ingredients
360g (about 4) ripe bananas
2½ cups rolled oats
½ cup peanut butter (smooth or crunchy)
200g (2 cups) almond meal
1½ tbsp honey
½ cup choc chips, optional

Method

Preheat oven to 180C. Line a baking tray with baking paper. In a large bowl mash bananas, stir through peanut butter and honey. Add oats, almond meal (and chocolate chips if using) and stir to combine. Take one heaped dessert spoonful of the mixture and ro into a ball. Place on the lined

Take one heaped dessert spoonful of the mixture and roll into a ball. Place on the lined tray and repeat until all mixture is used – leaving a small space between each ball. Using the clean palm of the hand, flatten each ball a little (biscuits will not spread much when baking). Bake for 15 minutes. Allow biscuits to cool on baking tray for a few minutes, then transfer to wire rack to cool. Store in airtight container. Makes 24 biscuits.



Minestrone Soup

Ingredients

30g butter

1 clove garlic, crushed

1 medium onion, chopped

100g bacon pieces, chopped

1 medium carrot, cut into small

pieces

2 sticks celery, thinly sliced 400g can crushed tomatoes 2 x 400g cans four bean mix

3 cups chicken or vegetable stock

2 tbsp tomato paste

1 tablespoon chopped parsley

½ cup small spiral pasta

1 tsp Italian seasoning

salt and pepper to taste

¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Method

In a large saucepan, melt the butter over medium heat. Add onion and bacon and cook for about 5 minutes until onion is soft, stirring occasionally. Add garlic, celery and carrot and continue stirring for 2 minutes. Add undrained crushed tomatoes, rinsed and drained four bean mix, stock,, tomato paste, parsley, and Italian seasoning.

Bring to boil and then reduce heat to low. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add pasta and continue simmering for further 15 minutes. Season with salt and pepper and serve sprinkled with grated Parmesan cheese.





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Eat Wave... budget meals for the family

Baked Sweet Potatoes make an economical light snack, small meal or even a dessert, when combined with your favourite topping ingredients. Listed below are

some topping suggestions. This is one of our favourites.

Ingredients

1 medium sweet potato

olive oil for coating

1 x 400g tin chickpeas, drained

½ tsp cinnamon

1 tsp cumin

1 tbsp olive oil

12 cherry tomatoes, halved

salt & pepper to season

butter (optional)

½ cup sour cream or Greek yoghurt

¼ tsp cumin, extra

flat leaf parsley, chopped



Method

Pre-heat oven to 180°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper.

Wash sweet potato, dry with paper towel then carefully cut in half length-ways (see note) and place cut-side down on prepared tray. Bake 20 minutes.

Rinse chickpeas with water, then dry between sheets of paper towel. Place chickpeas in a small bowl, add cinnamon, cumin and olive oil. And stir to coat, Place chickpeas and halved cherry tomatoes in an ovenproof dish lined with baking paper.

When sweet potato has been in oven for 20 minutes, place chickpeas and tomatoes in the oven and bake for a further 15 minutes. Remove all from oven and allow to cool slightly.

Place the sour cream (or yoghurt) in a small bowl, add extra cumin (1/4 tsp). Stir to combine.



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To serve, place baked sweet potato on plate, cut-side up. Spread with a little butter if using. Spoon chickpeas and tomato on top.

Sprinkle with chopped parsley; season with salt and pepper. Serve with sour cream (or Greek yoghurt) mixed with extra cumin.

Note: Cooking time will depend on size of sweet potatoes. They can be cooked whole - cooking time will be longer. Be careful when cutting in half. Suggest cutting through one side, then turning over and repeating on the other side.

Also if cooking more than one, try to select similar size, for even cooking time. Baked sweet potatoes can be refrigerated for up to 3 days.

Reheat with toppings (as needed) in microwave (or oven). Add cold toppings when serving.

More topping ideas: bolognese sauce, lentils, black beans, onion, mushrooms, tuna, sweetcorn, pineapple, beetroot, grated cheese, cottage cheese, feta, avocado, kale, bacon, scrambled eggs, broccoli, olives, tahini, garlic sauce, hummus, pesto, maple syrup, honey, coconut, peanut butter, walnuts, dried cranberries. Herbs and spices of choice... and a little butter to start with. Enjoy!

Chicken, Mushroom & Rice Bake

Ingredients

500g boneless, skinless chicken thighs salt & black pepper to season

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms
- 1 cup chicken or vegetable stock
- 3 tbsp sour cream
- 4 tbsp thickened cream
- 1 tsp Italian seasoning
- 34 cup uncooked medium grain rice grated Parmesan

finely chopped parsley

Method

Preheat oven to 180C.

Cut chicken into bite-sized pieces. Season with salt and black pepper.

Heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil in a frying pan on medium/high heat. Add



Add 1 tablespoon of olive oil to the pan and reduce heat to medium. Add onions and cook until translucent. Add garlic and cook for 30 seconds more. Increase heat to medium high and add sliced mushrooms. Cook mushrooms, stirring occasionally for 2 minutes.

Pour chicken broth into the pan and stir. Remove pan from the heat and stir in sour cream, thickened cream and Italian seasoning.

Spread rice over the base of a medium sized baking dish.

Pour cream mixture over rice and stir gently. Place chicken pieces in a layer on top. Cover tightly with aluminium foil and bake for 40 minutes. Serve with grated Parmesan and finely chopped parsley.Serves 4. 🥞



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
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
